DECIDUOUS SHRUBS

BARBERRY, 'Assorted Variety' (Berberis) Full sun to part shade, low to moderate water needs.

- Burgundy Carousel (Berberis thunbergii 'Bailtwo') Ht 3-4', Spd 4-5'
 - This is a selection of Japanese Barberry sporting slightly larger burgundy purple leaves. An attractive accent shrub. Slightly wider than tall with a spreading habit.
 - Concorde (Berberis thunbergii 'Concorde') Ht 1.5-2', Spd 2.5-3'
 - The Concorde Barberry is a dwarf globe-shaped barberry with deep purple, velvety foliage and red new growth making it an attractive plant for the perennial garden or the front of a shrub border. There is sparse red fruit for Fall. It can tolerate dry conditions.
- Crimson Pigmy (Berberis Thunbergii 'Crimson Pigmy') Ht 1.5-2.5', Spd 1.5-2.5'

Lowest growing form of Japanese Redleaf Barberry with dense, rounded habit and burgundy-red Summer foliage. Best color when planted in full

Emerald Carousel (Berberis x 'Tara') Ht 4-5', Spd 4-5'

sun.

- A cross between Japanese Green Barberry and Korean Barberry introduced by Bailey Nurseries. A compact plant with glossy dark green foliage. The outstanding orange to red Fall color appears early and remains late before leaves drop. Tolerates alkaline soil well.
- Gold Pillar (Berberis thunbergia 'Gold Pillar') Ht 3-4', Spd 1.5-2'
 - Gold Pillar barberry is a beautiful columnar plant with red new growth turning to a bright golden color. The foliage is burn resistant and will turn to an orange-red color in the Fall. This is a great plant for a formal border.
- Golden Devine (Berberis thunbergia 'Golden Devine') Ht 1-2', Spd 1.5-2'

This Japanese barberry has a bright, canary yellow color to the leaves edged in pink. Globe-shaped, slow growing and its tiny spines make this a first-class plant.

- Golden Rocket (Berberis thunbergii 'Golden Rocket') Ht 3-5', Spd 1-2'
 - A narrow, upright growing, deciduous shrub with showy, bright yellow foliage. Pale yellow, insignificant flowers in Spring are followed by bright red berries in Fall which persist through the Winter. The berries attract birds and other wildlife.
 - Golden Torch (Berberis thunbergii 'Golden Torch') Ht 4-6', Spd 2-3'
 - This barberry has a bright yellow color to the leaves with a hint of red. It grows very narrow making it great for smaller areas. This could also be used for container planting.
- Helmond Pillar (Berberis thunbergii 'Helmond Pillar') Ht 4-5', Spd 1-2'

This barberry has reddish-purple leaves that will turn a brilliant red color in the Fall. There are tiny sharp thorns on the red bark. The small

yellow flowers appear in early Spring but are often hidden by the foliage. It has a noticeable erect and narrow form maturing to 5' tall and less than 2' wide. **Japanese Redleaf** (*Berberis thunbergii 'Atropurpurea'*) Ht 4-6', Spd 4-6'

- Showy reddish-purple Summer foliage. Small yellow flowers appear in Spring followed by persistent red fruits. Irregular rounded habit with thorny branches. Orange to red Fall color. Does best in well-drained soil.
- Limoncello (Berberis thunbergii 'BailErin') Ht 3-5', Spd 3-4'
 - A rounded compact plant, new growth is lime green that develops a red edge. Outstanding yellow, orange, and red Fall color. A nice contrast to red-leafed barberries.
- Moscato (Berberis thunbergii 'BailAnna') Ht 2-3', Spd 3-5'
- Bright green and densely growing, this shrub will add a pop of color to your landscaping. Perfect for borders or even as a specimen plant in a small bed. Orange Rocket (*Berberis thunbergii 'Orange Rocket'*) Ht 3-5', Spd 1.5'
 - Vibrant coral-orange new foliage ages to mid-green, then turns ruby red in the Fall. This award winning, compact, upright growing shrub has a vigorous growth habit and improved resistance to rust. Use to brighten the landscape in mass plantings, as a specimen plant, or in a container.
- Rose Glow (Berberis thunbergii 'Rose Glow') Ht 4-5', Spd 4-5'
- Selection chosen for its unique foliage. New growth appears with a pink variegation that matures to a darker rose-red. Bright red berries in Fall and Winter. **Ruby Carousel** (*Berberis thunbergii 'Bailone'*) Ht 3-3.5', Spd 3-3.5'
 - Selected by Bailey Nurseries for uniform habit and red leaf color. Purple color accent on a compact rounded shrub. Well suited for a specimen as a border, hedge, or a barrier plant.
- Sunjoy Cinnamon (Berberis thunbergia) Ht 3-4', Spd 3-4'

The Sunjoy Cinnamon barberry has a dark orange red foliage and compact branching. It is great for foundation plantings or hedging. A great plant for color throughout the seasons.

- Sunjoy Citrus (Berberis thunbergia 'Koren' USPP 24,818) Ht 2-3', Spd 2-3' Long-lasting vibrant foliage provides a sunny burst of color from Spring through Fall. Can be planted as a low hedge or as an accent plant with its compact and round growth habit.
- Sunjoy Gold Pillar (Berberis thunbergia) Ht 3-4', Spd 1.5-2'
- Bright golden foliage and red new growth. The foliage is burn resistant and will turn to an orange-red color in the Fall. Distinctive columnar habit. Sunjoy Sequins (*Berberis thunbergia 'Sunjoy Sequins'*) Ht 2-3', Spd 3-4'
- This variegated barberry has an almost sparkling, sequined appearance. Eye-catching and more shade tolerant than other varieties.
- Sunjoy Todo (Berberis thunbergii 'Sunjoy Todo' 14805) Ht 1.5-2', Spd 1.5-2'

A dense and compact dwarf barberry. Ideal for edging and small gardens. Rich, burgundy, purple foliage gives bits of Winter color due to its semievergreen nature. An easy to grow and drought resistant plant.

BROOM, ROYAL GOLD COMPACT (Genista tinctroia 'Royal Gold') Ht 1-2', Spd 2' Full sun to part shade, low to moderate water needs.

Bright green leaves with yellow flowers appearing late Spring to early Summer. A compact low growing shrub that will do well in rocky/coarse soils.

BROOM, SPANISH GOLD (Cytisus purgans 'Spanish Gold') Ht 2-3', Spd 4-6' Full sun to part shade, low to moderate water needs.

Tight, dense broom with bright yellow flowers in late Spring to early Summer. Selected from the Alpine Gardens and Denver Botanic Gardens. Native to North Africa and Southern Europe. Far superior to other brooms available because of minimal Winter kill and ability to thrive in heavy soils. Benefits from some Winter water. Plant select in 2000.

BUCKTHORN, 'Assorted Variety' (Rhamnus) Full sun, low water needs.

- Columnar (Rhamnus frangula 'Columnaris') Ht 12-15', Spd 5-6'
 - Tall, columnar shrub with handsome glossy green foliage and purple fruit in the late Summer, not edible. It has a yellow Fall color. The unique vertical habit of this shrub makes it great for a dense hedge or screen. In spite of its name this shrub is thornless.
- Fernleaf (*Rhamnus frangula 'Asplenifolia'*) Ht 10-12', Spd 6-10'
- Densely growing shrub with narrow, fern-like foliage. Turns yellow in the Fall. Tolerant of a variety of growing conditions and make an excellent hedge. Fine Line (*Rhamnus frangula 'Ron Williams'* (*PP 14,791*)) Ht 5-7', Spd 2-3'
- The Line (*Rhammus Jranguta Kon withtams* (*FT 14,791*)) ft 5-7, spd 2-5 This Buckthorn combines the narrow fern-like foliage of R. asplenifolia with the upright habit of the 'Columnaris'. Making it a suitable choice for a narrow area, a small yard, or a living privacy fence.
- Smith's (*Rhamnus smithü*) Ht 6-10', Spd 10-14' (XERIC)

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- A native of central Colorado. Handsome, glossy dark green leaves and black fruits up to 1.5" long. Tolerant of dry conditions. Golden-yellow Fall color. There is a very nice specimen at Denver Botanic Gardens. Plant Select variety.
- Tallhedge Glossy (Rhamnus frangula 'Columnaris') Ht 8-12', Spd 3-4'
 - These shrubs are multi-stemmed and upright in form with medium texture. They have a dark green, shiny leaf. Flowers have an extremely long bloom time. The fruit is a showy reddish-black to purplish-black. Fall color is yellow.

BURNING BUSH, 'Assorted Variety' (Euonymus alatus) Full sun to part shade, low to moderate water needs.

- Burning Bush (*Euonymus alatus*) Ht 10-12', Spd 10-12'
 - Dark green leaves turn a radiant, show-stopping crimson-red in the Fall. The fruits look like red popcorn and are showy throughout much of the Winter. This is a favorite large accent plant that can be pruned into an interesting small tree. It is tough and disease resistant.
 - Dwarf Burning Bush (Euonymus alata 'Compactus') Ht 5-6', Spd 5-6'

A more dwarf form of the species. Crimson Fall foliage. Dark green leaves turning a radiant, show-stopping red. Fruits look like red popcorn and are showy though much of the Winter. Excellent use as a hedge specimen. Tough and disease resistant.

BUTTERFLY BUSH, 'Assorted Variety' (Buddleia) Full sun, low to moderate water needs. Dead heading often increases bloom production.

- > Attraction (Buddleia davidii 'Attraction') Ht 5', Spd 5'
 - This shrub is a vigorous grower with large reddish-purple flower spikes through Summer. Prefers a well-drained, moist, loamy type of soil. Also tolerates heat and drought after it becomes well established. Will attract hordes of bees and butterflies to your garden. Prune in the Spring as flower clusters will bloom on new growth each year. Best if cut back to 10" in the Spring. One of the reddest in color of the butterfly bushes.
- Bi Color (Buddleja x weyeriana 'Bicolor') Ht: 5-6', Spd 4'-6' Five to eight-inch-long eye-catching pink flowers with peachy throats stand out against the dark green leaves. Attracts butterflies. Great as a foundation plant, border, or as a specimen.
- Black Knight (Buddleia davidii 'Black Knight') Ht 5', Spd 5'
 - This shrub is a vigorous grower with large dark purple flower spikes through the Summer. It is attractive to butterflies. Tops can die back in northern areas, but will bloom on new wood each year.
- Blue (Buddleia davidii 'Blue') Ht 6-8', Spd 6'

This shrub is a vigorous grower with large flower spikes through the Summer. Prefers a well-drained, moist, loamy type soil. Tolerates heat and drought after it becomes well established. Will attract hordes of bees and butterflies to your garden. Prune in the Spring as flower clusters will bloom on new growth each year. Best if cut back to 10" in the Spring.

> 3 N 1 Bouquet (Buddleia davidii 'Bouquet') Ht 5-8', Spd 4-7'

Blooms fragrant clusters of colorful flowers (white, pink, and purple) throughout the Summer. Best flower production in full sun. Remove dead blooms to promote repeat blooming. Prune back to ground in Spring. Butterflies love this shrub!

Buzz Magenta (Buddleia davidii 'Buzz Magenta') Ht 3-5', Spd 3-5'

Beautiful magenta pink blossoms with golden centers cover this plant. It is a more compact bush. This butterfly bush will grow from new wood so they do best if cut way back while they are dormant. Be patient with them as they require our temperatures to be warm before they do much in the Summer.

BUTTERFLY BUSH, 'Assorted Variety' (Buddleia) Full sun, low to moderate water needs. Dead heading often increases bloom production.

Buzz Hot Raspberry (Buddleia davidii 'Buzz Hot Rasp') Ht 3-4', Spd 3-4'

This is a more compact form of the butterfly bush with beautiful big panicles of raspberry pink flowers. The flowers are very fragrant as well. These plants do best when cut back in the Fall or early Spring as they grow from new wood in the Summer. Be patient as they require our temperatures to stay fairly consistent before they do much in the Summer.

Cran-Razz (Buddleia davidii 'Cranrazz') Ht 5-6', Spd 3-4'

The Cran-Razz Butterfly Bush has a beautiful violet to cranberry pink flowers that bloom in Summer. This butterfly bush has a more upright growth than others. These plants do best when cut back in the Fall or early Spring as they grow from new wood in the Summer. Be patient as they require our temperatures to stay fairly consistent before they do much in the Summer.

> Dark Knight (Buddleia davidii) Ht 5', Spd 5'

This shrub is a vigorous grower with large flower spikes from July through September. It is attractive to butterflies. Tops can die back in northern areas, but will bloom on new wood each year.

> Dwarf Purple (Buddleia davidii 'Dwarf Purple') Ht 3-5', Spd 3-5'

This shrub is a vigorous grower with large flower spikes through Summer. It has very fragrant flowers that are attractive to butterflies. The plant dies back to the ground in the Winter and will grow on old wood the next Spring/Summer. Be patient with these plants, they typically don't do much until June. They need consistent warm weather to grow!

> Ellen's Blue (Buddleia davidii 'Ellen's Blue') Ht 3-5', Spd 3-4'

This shrub is a vigorous grower with large flower spikes in Summer. Tops can die back in northern areas, but will bloom on new wood each year. Silver green foliage with an electric blue flower. As the name suggests, butterflies love this plant!

> Empire Blue (Buddleia davidii 'Empire Blue') Ht 3-5', Spd 3-4'

The Empire Blue butterfly bush, also known as the Summer Lilac, has beautiful panicles of violet flowers with orange eyes. They typically bloom mid-Summer well into the Fall. The gray-green foliage is a wonderful contrast to the dark flowers. As with any butterfly bush, it needs to be cut back and will grow back from the ground up the following Spring.

Flutterby Pink (Buddleia davidii 'Flutterby Pink') Ht 3-4', Spd 3-4'

This shrub is a vigorous grower with pink flower spikes through Summer. Prefers a well-drained, moist, loamy type of soil, also, tolerates heat and drought once it is well established. Will attract hordes of bees and butterflies to your garden. Prune in the Spring as flower clusters will bloom on new growth each

year. The more you trim, the more it blooms, Best if cut back to 10" in the Spring.

Honeycomb (Buddleia davidii 'Honeycomb') Ht 5-7', Spd 4-5'

- This shrub is a vigorous grower with large flower spikes in Summer. It is attractive to butterflies. Tops can die back in northern areas, but will bloom on new wood each year. The Honeycomb has yellow blossoms with orange eyes.
- > Lo & Behold Purple Haze (Buddleia davidii 'Purple Haze') Ht 2-3', Spd 3-4'
 - This is a low maintenance butterfly bush. It reblooms well without deadheading. It has blue-purple flowers throughout the Summer. Blooms continuously from Summer to Fall. Be patient, as they require our temperatures to stay fairly consistent before they do much in the Summer.
- Lo & Behold Ruby Chip (Buddleia davidii 'Lo & Behold Ruby Chip') Ht 2-3', Spd 2-3'

This is a low maintenance butterfly bush, that will continue to bloom without deadheading. A tidy, garden friendly size shrub with large magenta blooms throughout the Summer. These plants do best when cut back in the Fall or early Spring as they grow from new wood in the Summer. Be patient, as they require our temperatures to stay fairly consistent before the do much in the Summer.

- Lo & Behold (Buddleia davidii 'Lo & Behold Blue Chip') Ht 2-3', Spd 2-3'
 - This is a low maintenance butterfly bush. It reblooms well without deadheading. It has blue-purple flowers throughout the Summer. These plants do best when cut back in the Fall or early Spring as the grow from new wood in the Summer. Be patient, they require our temperatures to stay fairly consistent before they do much in the Summer.
- Midnight Buzz (Buddleia davidii 'Midnight Buzz') Ht 3-4', Spd 3-4'

The Midnight Buzz Butterfly Bush is a more compact, dwarf butterfly bush. The beautiful violet flowers appear in the Summer and bloom well into the Fall. This is a very fragrant shrub as well. The butterfly bush will grow from new wood so they do best if cut way back while they are dormant. Be patient with them as they require our temperatures to be warm before they do much in the Summer.

- Miss Molly (Buddleia x 'Miss Molly') Ht 4-5', Spd 4-5'
 - This shorter variety of butterfly bush that has large fragrant sangria-red flowers all Summer. For best flower production, remove spent blooms regularly. Prune back to the ground in early Spring. As the name implies, butterflies love this plant as do hummingbirds.
- Miss Ruby (Buddleia davidii 'Miss Ruby' USPP 19950) Ht 3-4', Spd 3-4

This shorter variety of butterfly bush that has large fragrant sangria-red flowers all Summer. For best flower production, remove spent blooms regularly. Prune back to the ground in early Spring. As the name implies, butterflies love this plant as do hummingbirds.

Nanho Blue (Buddleia davidii 'Nanho Blue') Ht 6-8', Spd 5-6'

This deciduous shrub has fragrant, long tapering flowers all Summer long. Often referred to as the Summer Lilac. Best flower production in full sun. Remove dead flowers to promote repeat bloom. More compact leaf than other varieties. Prune back to ground in Spring. Butterflies love this shrub.

- Nanho Pink (Buddleia davidii 'Nanho Pink') Ht 6-8', Spd 5-6'
 - This deciduous shrub has fragrant, long tapering flowers all Summer long. Best flower production in full sun. Remove dead flowers to promote repeat bloom, more compact leafed than other varieties. Prune back to ground in Spring. Butterflies love this shrub.
- Nanho Purple (Buddleia davidii 'Nanho Purple') Ht 2-3', Spd 2-4'
 - This deciduous shrub has fragrant, long tapering flowers all Summer. Best flower production in full sun. Remove dead flowers to promote repeat bloom. Prune back to ground in Spring. As the name implies, butterflies love this plant, as do hummingbirds.
- > Petite Blue Heaven (Buddleia davidii 'Fly PT Blu Hvn PP22069') Ht 2-2.5', Spd 2-2.5'
- This is more of a ground cover form of butterfly bush. It is great for embankments or places where a lower growing butterfly bush is wanted. The blue blossoms bloom well through the Summer into Fall. The leaves have a silver color to them. This plant is great for attracting humming birds and butterflies.
- Petite Tuti Fruiti (Buddleia davidii 'Fly PT Tutifrti PPAF') Ht 2-2.5', Spd 2-2.5' This is more of a ground cover form of butterfly bush. It is great for embankments or places where a lower growing butterfly bush is wanted. The pink blossoms will bloom well through the Summer into Fall. This plant is great for attracting humming birds and butterflies.
- Pink Charm (Buddleia davidii 'Pink Charm') Ht 4-6', Spd 4-6'
 - The Pink Charm butterfly bush has beautiful spikes of pink flowers through the Summer into the Fall. The branches are slender arching with green leaves. It is best to cut the plant back to the ground when it is dormant and it will come back the following Spring.
- Pink Delight (Buddleia davidii 'Pink Delight') Ht 6-8', Spd 6-8'
 - This shrub is a vigorous grower with large pink flower spikes. Large, fragrant flower clusters emit a delicate scent that attracts butterflies and hummingbirds to your garden. Pink Delight Butterfly Bush blooms Summer to Fall. For best results cut back to 6-8" each Spring.
- Pink (Buddleia davidii 'Pink') Ht 4-6', Spd 4-6'
 - This shrub is a vigorous grower with large flower spikes. Large, fragrant flower clusters emit a delicate scent that attracts butterflies and hummingbirds to your garden. Blooms Summer to Fall. For best results, cut back to 6-8" each Spring.
- Princeton Purple (Buddleia davidii 'Princeton Purple') Ht 5', Spd 5'
 - As the name implies, this plant's large cluster of deep purple blooms are very attractive to butterflies. Prune in the Spring as flower clusters will bloom on new growth each year.
- Pugster Blue (Buddleia x 'SMNBDBT') Ht 2', Spd 2-3'

This is a shorter variety of butterfly bush that has large, full-sized flowers. Fragrant blue flowers all Summer. For best flower productions, remove spent blooms regularly. Prune back to the ground in early Spring, As the name implies, butterflies love this plant as do hummingbirds.

- Purple (Buddleia davidii 'Purple') Ht 5', Spd 5'
 - This shrub is a vigorous grower with large, fragrant purple flower spikes in Summer. Tops can die back in northern areas, but will bloom on new wood each year. As the name implies, this plant is very attractive to butterflies.
- > Red (Buddleia davidii 'Red Butterfly') Ht 3-6', Spd 3-6'
 - Produces clusters of purple-red flowers in the Summer. The fragrant blooms attract all varieties of pollinators. Excellent for borders or accent planting. Valued for its intense, deeply colored wine-red flowers.
- Royal Red (Buddleia davidii 'Royal Red') Ht 5-8', Spd 5-6'
 - Large red to pink flower spikes in Summer. This beautiful selection has a naturally relaxed habit giving it a shorter appearance. Tops can die back in northern areas, but will bloom on new wood each year. As the name implies, this plant is very attractive to butterflies.
- Silver Fountain (Buddleia alternifolia 'Argentea') Ht 8-10', Spd 6-8'
 - A shrub that does well in a variety of soils and forms a striking vase-shaped mound. The twigs are long and thin, giving the plant a wide spreading and pendulous habit. The foliage is blue gray or sometimes silver, and finely textured. Fragrant flowers throughout the Summer are a bright lilac and spiral along the previous year's branches in candy-cane fashion. Very attractive to butterflies. Plant Select winner 1998.

White Profusion (Buddleia davidii 'White Profusion') Ht 6-8', Spd 6'

This shrub is a vigorous grower with large flower spikes in Summer. Prefers a well-drained, moist, loamy type soil and tolerates heat and drought after it becomes well established. Will attract hordes of bees and butterflies to your garden. Prune in the Spring as flower clusters will bloom on new growth each year. The more you trim it, the more it blooms. Best if cut back to 10" in the Spring. The profuse blooms are white with a yellow center.

CORALBERRY, 'Assorted Variety' (Symphoricarpos) Full sun to part shade, low to moderate water needs.

- Candy (Symporicarpos x doorenbosii 'Kolmacan' PP 20, 931) Ht 2-3', Spd 2-3'
 - Pink flowers bloom mid-Summer followed by showy, cotton candy- colored berries. Attracts pollinators and birds to your landscaping! Berries are persistent and will hold tight to the branches long after the leaves drop in the Fall.
 - Hancock (Symphoricarpos x chenaultii 'Hancock') Ht 2-3', Spd 6-10'
 - Light blue-green, fine textured foliage with small, pink Spring flowers, followed by red berries that hold into Winter. The spreading habit creates an excellent groundcover for erosion control on banks and slopes. Benefits from aggressive rejuvenation pruning every few years.
- Red (Symphoricarpos orbiculatus) Ht 3-4', Spd 4-5'
 - Upright, arching growth habit with slender branches. Profusion of creamy white Summer flowers. Heavily fruited with large clusters of 1/4" coral red berries that last all Winter. Good for erosion control, or groundcover.

CURRANT, 'Assorted Variety' (Ribes) Full sun to part shade. Drought tolerant once established. (XERIC)

- Alagan Black (Ribes nigrum 'Alagan') Ht 5-6', Spd 3-4'
 - The Alagan black currant is an upright selection of currant with a sweeter flavor then most of the other currant berries. It has white flowers in May followed by purple-black currants that ripen in July to August. The fruit has been used for teas, liquors, jams, dried fruit, sore throat remedies as well as scent for soap. This plant prefers well drained soils and the leaves can sunburn in full sun.
- Alpine (*Ribes alpinum*) Ht 3-5', Spd 3-5'
 - Compact rounded bush excellent for small hedges or as a backdrop for flowers. Requires very little maintenance and has a neat, tidy appearance. Glossy, dark green Summer foliage.
- Crandall Clove (*Ribes odoratum 'Crandall'*) Ht 4-6', Spd 4-6' Native shrub with yellow trumpet-shaped flowers in Spring. The flowers have a strong clove fragrance. Black ½"- ¾" fruits ripen in mid-Summer with a sweet spicy flavor. Light green tri-lobed foliage turns orange in Fall.
 - Golden (Ribes aureum) Ht 5-6', Spd 5-6'
 - Cinnamon-scented, yellow flowers in Spring. Green, lobed leaves turn scarlet in Fall. Makes a nice accent or hedge.
- Green Mound Alpine (*Ribes alpinum 'Green Mound'*) Ht 2-4', Spd 2-4'
 - Green Mound Currant is a small, compact srub with glossy, dark green leaves. Smaller than the standard Alpine Currant, the Green Mound produces insignificant, greenish yellow clusters of flowers in Spring, but will not produce fruit.
- Gwen's Buffalo (Ribes aureum 'Gwen's Buffalo') Ht 5-6', Spd 5-6'
 - A selection of the Rocky Mountain native with an imporved fruiting habit. Very fragrant yellow blooms appear in Spring followed by black teardrop-shaped edible fruit. Fall color is a fine orange to red. Tolerates dry conditions.
- Hardy Red Flowering (Ribes x gordonianum) Ht 5-6', Spd 3-4'
- A hardy red flowering currant blooming in Spring with pendulous racemes up to 6" in length. Dark green leaves and fruitless.
- Red Lake (Ribes sativum 'Red Lake') Ht 5-6', Spd 3-4,

Medium sized red berries in long, easy to pick clusters ripen mid-Summer. Vigorous, high yielding variety that produces fruit on 2 to 3 year old wood. Great for jams, jellies, pies, or fresh for those like tart fruit. Best fruit production in full sun.

- DAPHNE, CAROL MACKIE (Daphne x burkwoodi 'Carol Mackie') Ht 3-5', Spd 3-5' Part sun to shade, low to moderate water needs.
 - A densely branched, semi-evergreen shrub. Narrow medium green leaves are edged in cream white. Clusters of intensely fragrant, ½" tubular pink flowers that bloom in Spring followed by ½" red berries. Does not like to be planted in hot-spots such as south or west exposures. Plant select 1997.

FORSYTHIA, 'Assorted Variety' (Forsythia) Full sun, low to moderate water needs.

Gold Tide (Forsythia x 'Gold Tide') Ht 2-3', Spd 3-4'

 \triangleright

- The gold tide forsythia is a dwarf cultivar that gives a great pop of bright yellow color in the Spring.
- Kumson (Forsythia viridissima koreana 'Kumson') Ht 4-6', Spd 3-5'
 - A new variegated forsythia with dark green leaves that have white veins. This forsythia was discovered in Korea by Spring Meadow Nursery. The flower buds are not as hardy as the 'Northern Gold', but this plant is worth a try for its striking variegated foliage.
 - Lynwood Gold (Forsythia x intermedia 'Lynwood Gold') Ht 6-9', Spd 6-9'
 - Thy Lynwood Gold forsythia gives a beautiful pop of yellow color in the Spring. The yellow flowers bloom evenly along the branches followed by deep green leaves. The Fall color is yellow.
- > Northern Gold (*Forsythia x 'Northern Gold'*) Ht 6-8', Spd 5-7'
 - Upright form. Outstanding yellow flowers with excellent bud hardiness. Lower growing than other Forsythias.
 - Spring Glory (Forsythia x intermedia 'Spring Glory') Ht 6-8', Spd 5-7'
 - Vigorous shrub with small, yellow blooms in early Spring. Upright branches.

FOUR WINGED SALTBRUSH (*Atriplex canescens*) Ht 3-5', Spd 3-4' Full sun. Drought tolerant once established. (XERIC) A native shrub with dark, gray-green foliage and an upright spreading habit. A four-winged fruit appears in late Summer on the female plants, turning to a rose color in

the Fall. This plant is very tolerant of poor soils and is useful for soil stabilization.

HONEYSUCKLE, 'Assorted Variety' (Lonicera) Full sun to part shade, low to moderate water needs.

- > Arnold Red (Lonicera tatarica 'Arnold Red') Ht 8-10', Spd 6-8'
 - Attractive, dark blue-green foliage on graceful branches. Profuse flower display of fragrant, dark red blooms in Spring, followed by large bright red berries through Summer. Easily grown in any soil. Effectively used for borders or informal hedges.
- Blue Velvet (Lonicera korolkowii 'Floribunda') Ht 8-10', Spd 8-12'

An experiment from the Cheyenne station that is very hardy. Pubescent light blue foliage in Spring matures to gray-green. Pale pink flowers bloom in profusion mid to late Spring, followed by red berries which are not edible. Plant select winner in 1999.

- Cheyenne Pink Velvet (Lonicera korolkowii 'Cheyenne Pink Velvet') Ht 8-10', Spd 8-12'
 - A seedling 'accidentally' found while collecting cuttings of Blue Velvet honeysuckle at the Cheyenne station. Blooms profusely with medium pink flowers in the Spring. An added bonus, it is resistant to the witches' broom aphid that can be an annoying pest on other shrub honeysuckle varieties.
- Clavey's Dwarf (Lonicera x xylosteoides 'Clavey's Dwarf') Ht 6', Spd 4'

Yellow flowers in Spring, red berries in Fall, good compact foliage. Makes a good hedge.

> Dwarf Bush (Diervilla lonicera) Ht 3-4', Spd 3-4'

Dwarf mounding shrub with green foliage. Throughout the seasons this is a multi-colored plant. Leaves emerging a reddish-purple in the Spring, and then turning green as they mature. No known insect or disease problems. Reddish-purple Fall color. Small yellow flowers add additional interest during early Summer. Excellent for mass planting and slopes.

Emerald Mound (Lonicera xylosteum 'Emerald Mound') Ht 2-4', Spd 4-6'

Shrub with low arching branches forming a compact mound. Insignificant pale-yellow flowers are followed by attractive dark red berries in Fall. Dark green leaves appear very early in Spring. No significant Fall colors. Excellent in foundations plantings or as a ground cover.

Heckrotti (Lonicera tatarica 'heckrotti') Ht 8-10', Spd 6-8' Attractive dark blue-green foliage on graceful branches. Profuse flower display of

Attractive, dark blue-green foliage on graceful branches. Profuse flower display of fragrant dark red blooms in Spring, followed by large, bright red berries through Summer. Easily grown in any soil. Effectively used for borders or informal hedges.

Honeyrose (Lonicera 'Honeyrose') Ht 10', Spd 8-10'

This variety of Honeysuckle is a hardy shrub that is great for making hedges, screening, or windbreaks. It has an upright broad growth habit with a medium textured deep blue-green foliage. The flowers appear in Spring on old growth and are followed by a small red fruit. The flowers attract humming birds and butterflies.

> Tiny Trumpets (Lonicera syringantha wolfii) Ht 3-6', Spd 6-9'

A dense, finely branched shrub with a horizontal growth habit. The narrow blue-green leaves contrast nicely with the red stem color of new growth. Extremely fragrant pale violet flowers are borne in clusters in late Spring. A plant worth growing for its sweet flowers.

HYDRANGEA, 'Assorted Variety' Part sun to shade, low to moderate water needs.

> Annabelle (Hydrangea arborescens 'Annabelle') Ht 3-5', Spd 3-6'

Dense shrub with large to medium green leaves and stout stems creating a coarse texture. Huge 12" wide globe-shaped clusters of flowers, opening pale green and maturing to white, are borne throughout the Summer. Generally, dies to the ground and should be pruned just above the soil in late Fall or early Spring. Prefers well-drained soil.

Bee Friendly (Hydrangea arborescens 'Bee Friend;y') Ht 3-4', Spd 3-4'

Scott Skogerboe of Fort Collins Wholesale Nursery collected seeds in Michigan from wild plants at the Morton Arboretum. He has been growing these plants since 200 and the pollinators can't resist them! Most smooth hydrangea are sterile and aren't attractive to the pollinators such as bees and other beneficial insects, but not this one! The flower clusters are smaller than most hydrangea.

> Endless Summer (Hydrangea macrophylla 'Bailmer' (P.P. #15,298)) Ht 3-5', Spd 3-5'

"Mop head" blossoms start in the late Spring and will continue periodically until the Fall. In our alkaline soil, you should expect the blooms to be pink tinged with white. In acidic soils, the blooms are blue tinged with white.

Invincible Spirit (Hydrangea arborescens) Ht 3-4', Spd 3-4'

Rich pink flowers bloom from early Summer to frost. Dark pink buds open to hot pink flowers which then turn soft pink as they mature, finally changing to green at the end of their life cycle. Very hardy. Reliable bloomer.

Limelight (Hydrangea paniculate 'Limelight') Ht 6-8', Spd 6-8'

Hydrangea with large, 6"-8" long by 6"-12" wide, conical green/white flower clusters in July. Unique creamy-chartreuse blooms in mid-Summer that change to pink in Fall. Large green leaves give this shrub a very coarse texture. Fall color is minimal. Plant this hydrangea as a specimen or in groupings in perennial or shrub borders. To encourage larger flower heads, prune to 5-10 shoots. Prefers well-drained soil.

- Little Lime (Hydrangea paniculate 'Jane') Ht 4-5', Spd 4-5' A dwarf version of the Limelight Hydrangea with conical green/ white flower clusters in July. Unique creamy-Chartreuse blooms in mid-Summer that change to pink in Fall. Larger green leaves give this shrub a very coarse texture. Fall color is minimal. Plant this hydrangea as a specimen or in groupings in perennial or shrub borders. Prefers well-drained soil.
- Mongolian (Mongolian hydrangea 'Bretchneideri') Ht 4-6', Spd 4-6'

Large white lace cap flowers that are both flat and decorative, can eventually turn to a pale pink as they mature. The lace cap flowers have little buds in the center, this is where the bees gather pollen and nectar. This deciduous shrub has a chestnut brown exfoliating trunk. Mongolian hydrangea is an extremely cold hardy selection.

> PEEGEE (Hydrangea paniculata 'Grandiflora') Ht 6-12', Spd 6-10'

Hydrangea with large, 6"-8" long by 6"-12" wide, conical white flower clusters in Summer. Flowers open white, then age to a pale purple-pink. Large, green leaves give this shrub a very coarse texture. Fall color is minimal. Over time, in a sheltered location, this plant will become a small tree to 1"-2" in caliper. To encourage larger flower heads, prune to 5-10 shoots. Prefers well-drained soil.

> Little Quick Fire (Hydrangea paniculate 'SMHPLQF') Ht 3-5', Spd 5-7'

The Quick Fire Hydrangea is one of the earliest hydrangeas to bloom in the Summer. The cone-shaped flower clusters emerge a white color and turn to pink as they mature. This makes a beautiful cut flower.

Snow Queen Oakleaf (*Hydrangea quercifolia 'Flemygea'*) Ht 4-6', Spd 6-8'

Thrives in moist, well drained soils. Should be planted in a sheltered location. Has an upright, broad and rounded growing habit. The white flowers slowly turn pinkish-purple as they age. Somewhat coarse, lobed and oak-like leaves turn a shade of bronze, maroon and purple in Fall.

Vanilla Strawberry (Hydrangea paniculata 'Renhy' (PP 20,670)) Ht 6-7', Spd 4-5'

This hydrangea is a relative of the PeeGee Hydrangea. It has beautiful full cone shaped blossoms that start in the late Spring and usually bloom until the Fall. The buds open white with a pink blush. As the blossoms mature, the flowers become a deeper, richer pink-red color.

LEAD PLANT, 'Assorted Variety' (Amorpha) Full sun. Drought tolerant once established. (XERIC)

- > Dwarf Lead Plant (Amorpha nana) Ht 2-3', Spd 2-3'
 - This is a dwarf native shrub with a rounded compact habit similar to A. canescens but blooms 2-4 weeks earlier and has a greener foliage. The long slender spikes of small purple flowers emerge mid to late Summer. They are naturally found up at 7200' and are drought tolerant.
- Lead Plant (Amorpha canescens) Ht 2-4', Spd 3-5'
 - Nitrogen fixing native shrub with 3-4" spikes of purple flowers appearing mid to late Summer. Open habit with arching stems. Pinnately compound leaves having small, oval, gray-green leaflets. When in bloom, one of the showier western plants. Tolerates dry soils.

LILAC, 'Assorted Variety' (Syringa) Full sun to part shade, low to moderate water needs.

> Asessippi Lilac (Syringa x hyacinthiflora 'Asessippi') Ht 10-12', Spd 10-12'

This lilac has profuse, fragrant, lavender blooms. It is the first to bloom of the Hyacinthfloras. It is a well-formed shrub, suitable for many locations.

> Beauty of Moscow (Syringa vulgaris 'Beauty of Moscow') Ht 10-12', Spd 8-10'

Pale lavender-pink buds open to double white fragrant flowers in Spring whose pointed petals give a star-shaped look.

- Bloomerang (Syringa x 'Penda' P.P. #20,575) Ht 4-5', Spd 4-5'
 - The Bloomerang Lilac is a new type of lilac that has a much more significant bloom time. It will bloom with purple flowers first in the Spring and can bloom throughout the Summer as well. There is a rest break between blooms (usually during the heat of the Summer). It has a compact mounding form and is a great plant for any garden.
- Charles Joly (Syringa vulgaris 'Charles Joly) Ht 8-10', Spd 8-10'

Double, dark reddish-purple, wonderfully fragrant blooms in Spring. An old-time selection from France.

Cheyenne Littleleaf (Syringa microphylla 'Cheyenne') Ht 6-9', Spd 9-12'

A dense broad shrub spreading nearly twice as wide as tall, with long wispy branches that droop under the weight of its blooms. The medium green leaves are approximately half the size of the common lilac. Flowers are pink and fragrant, appearing in Spring. Often, there is a sporadic secondary bloom in late Summer. This plant grows late into the year and can show some tip dieback if there is an early freeze. Fort Collins Wholesale produces a selection of these lilacs from the Cheyenne Experimental Station.

- Common Purple (Syringa vulgaris) Ht 12-15', Spd 8-12' (XERIC)
- Large panicles of fragrant lavender purple flowers appear in Spring. Great for informal hedges or screens. Tolerant of alkaline soil and drought conditions. **Dwarf Korean** (*Syringa meyeri 'Palibin'*) Ht 5-7' Spd 5-7'
 - Small, wavy, dark green leaves and fragrant lavender flowers in Spring. Blooms well at an early age. Full, evenly-shaped plant. It is excellent as a foundation or border plant, alone or in masses.
- Lemoine (Syringa vulgaris 'Mme. Lemoine') Ht 8-12', Spd 8' (XERIC)
 - Clusters of fragrant, double, white flowers emerge from creamy-white buds in Spring. Victor Lemoine, the French nurseryman and lilac breeder named this lilac after his wife.
- Ludwig Spaeth Lilac (Syringa vulgaris 'Ludwig Spaeth') Ht 6-8', Spd 6-8'
 - Heavily fragrant blooms cover this shrub in late Spring Summer. Excellent for hedges or specimen planting.
- Minuet Canadian (Syringa x prestoniae 'Minuet') Ht 6-9', Spd 4-6'
- Dense, upright form. Fragrant, lavender flowers bloom in the Spring.
- Miss Canada (Syringa x prestoniae 'Miss Canada') Ht 6-9', Spd 6-9'
- This lilac has true, deep pink flowers in Spring. It is a smaller, more rounded form than the other Canadian Lilacs. A hardy, late blooming variety. Miss Kim (Syringa pubescens subsp. patula 'Miss Kim') Ht 4-6', Spd 3-5'
- Hardy, late blooming lilac with dark green foliage. Pale blue lilac flowers appear late Spring after other lilacs have finished. Good, burgundy Fall color. A selection made from a lilac native to the Korean mountains and named after the most common name in Korea. Prefers a moist, but well drained soil.
- Monge (Syringa vulgaris 'Monge') Ht 10-12', Spd 8-12'
- Blooming in late Spring, large, single, deep purple florets are borne on long symmetrical panicles. Blossoms lasting 3-4 weeks. Profuse bloomer. Montaigne (*Syringa vulgaris 'Montaigne'*) Ht 10-12', Spd 8-10'
- A Spring bloomer with lavender pink buds that open to double, pale lavender florets. Panicles are long, narrow, and open. An ideal shrub for screening. Mount Baker (Syringa x hyacinthiflora 'Mount Baker') Ht 10-12', Spd 10-12'
- Fragrant, large snowy panicles of single white flowers in Spring. Purplish Fall color. Disease resistant.
- Nocturne Canadian (Syringa x prestoniae 'Nocturne') Ht 10-12', Spd 10-12'
- Lavender blue. These extremely hardy, late blooming lilacs flower late Spring. This is the easiest lilac to train into a single stem specimen.
- Pocohontas (Syringa x hyacinthiflora 'Pocohontas') Ht 10-12', Spd 10-12'
- Single, deep violet blooms in Spring cover this lilac in a cloud of fragrance. A tough, showy lilac that has one of the best flower displays as a young plant. **President Grevy** (Syringa vulgaris 'President Grevy') Ht 10-12', Spd 8-10' (XERIC)
- Double, cone shaped violet-blue fragrant flowers appear in mid Spring. Ideal as a flowering hedge or screen. Butterflies love these!
- Saugeana Chinese (Syringa x chinensis 'Saugeana') Ht 10-12', Spd 8-10' Profuse bloomer with fragrant, rich, purple to red flowers that bloom in Spring. Fast growing, with smaller leaves then most lilacs. Terrific cut flower.
- Sensation (Syringa vulgaris 'Sensation' (PP1242)) Ht 8-10', Spd 8-12'
 - This lovely unusual lilac boasts large single florets of purple edged with white in Spring. Plant this lilac where its unique flowers can be enjoyed up close, very striking!
 - Tinkerbell (Syringa x 'Bailbelle') Ht 5-6', Spd 4-5'

A new lilac introduced by Bailey Nurseries resulting from a cross between *S. meyeri 'Palabin'* and *S. microphylla 'Suberba'*. A compact lilac with a later bloom time than the French hybrids. Wine-red buds open to pink trumpet shaped florets with a spicy fragrance late Spring.

- Wedgewood Blue (Syringa Vulgaris) Ht 5-6', Spd 6-8'
 - Unique lilac with dark green foliage, lilac-pink buds opening into large, single true-blue blossoms in Spring. Disease resistant and adaptable to wide range of soils. A fine fragrance and excellent for cuttings.

MOCKORANGE, 'Assorted Variety' (Philadelphus) Full sun to part shade, low to moderate water needs.

Cheyenne (Philadelphus lewisii 'PWY01S') Ht 6-9', Spd 5-8'

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- Broad rounded to upright shrub. Numerous dense racemes of 1"-1.25" pure white flowers appear in early Summer. Flowers have a sweet fragrance. This is the only Mockorange at the Cheyenne Station that is still blooming and doing well after many years of neglect.
- Littleeaf (Philadelphus microphyllus) Ht 3-4', Spd 3-5' (XERIC) Slow growing native species of Mockorange that can reach 6ft in height. Pure white starry flowers bloom early Summer and are quite fragrant. The ½'' leaves are small for the species and give this plant a unique fine texture.
 - Miniature Snowflake (Philadelphus 'Miniature Snowflake') Ht 2.5-3', Spd 2-2.5'
 - This is a dwarf, compact shrub with dark green foliage and prolific producers of double white, extremely fragrant flowers in early Summer. Their neat, dense growth habit and showy blooms make this an excellent small accent or low informal hedge. Keep away from reflective surfaces on western or southern exposures.
- Minnesota Snowflake (Philadelphus virginalis 'Minnesota Snowflake') Ht 3-5', Spd 3-5'
 - Double, very sweet scented, white flowers in early Summer. A well branched shrub retaining its foliage better than most Mockoranges.

NINEBARK, 'Assorted Variety' (Physocarpus opulifolius) Full sun to part shade, low to moderate water needs.

Amber Jubilee (Physocarpus opulifolius 'Jefam' PP23,177) Ht 5-6', Spd 4-5'

Rounded and dense in habit with a bold array of colors in glowing tones of orange, yellow and gold. Amber JubileeTM stands out in the garden border or makes an eye-catching hedge. Clusters of delicate white blooms in early Summer add extra interest. Plant in full sun for best performance

- Center Glow (Physocarpus opulifolius 'Center Glow' (PP16,894)) Ht 8-10', Spd 7-9'
- This shrub has a bold array of colors that lends excitement to the shrub border all seasons. It is much like the Diablo Ninebark except the red color is far brighter and the new foliage emerges a glowing yellow-green and has creamy-white flowers in early Summer.
- Coppertina (*Physocarpus opulifolius 'Mindia'*) Ht 8-10', Spd 5-6'
- The Coppertina has a beautiful copper colored foliage as it appears in the Spring turning to a deep burgundy red as it matures. They have a soft pink flower in early Summer that turn to a red seed capsule in the Fall. The branches have an arching habit with exfoliating bark.
- > Dart's Gold (Physocarpus opulifolius 'Dart's Gold') Ht 4-6', Spd 5-6'
 - Small, dense upright shrub. Foliage emerges golden-yellow then matures to a bright yellow-green. White flowers open early Summer. One of the best performing yellow foliage plants for alkaline soils.
- Diabolo (Physocarpus opulifolius 'Monlo') Ht 8-10', Spd 8-10'
 - A ninebark selected for bright maroon leaf color. Cream white flowers accent the red-purple foliage in early Summer. Needs full sun for best foliage color. Its upright arching habit and leaf color make this an excellent plant for a hedge of a shrub border.
 - Dwarf Ninebark (*Physocarpus opulifolius 'Nana'*) Ht 4-6', Spd 4-6' Attractive plant with small green leaves on a dense, bushy form. White flowers in early Summer are followed by small reddish-brown seed pods. Its exfoliating bark, seed pods, and red to brown Fall color gives year-round interest.
- Ginger Wine (*Physocarpus opulifolius 'SMNPOBLR'*) Ht 5-6', Spd 5-6'
- Burgundy foliage and unique peeling bark give this shrub interest throughout all seasons. An adaptable North American native well-suited to difficult sites. Lemon Candy (*Physocarpus opulifolius 'Podaras 3' Plant Patent #22,362*) Ht 2-3', Spd 2-3'
 - The Lemon Candy Ninebark will add beautiful color to your landscape! The leaves emerge a lemon-yellow color and turn a chartreuse color as they mature. White flowers appear in early Summer and turn to a red capsule in the Fall.
- Little Devil (Physocarpus opulifolius 'Donna May' PP 22634) Ht 3-4', Spd 3-4'
 - Little DevilTM packs color and texture into a compact, easy to care for Ninebark. It features beautiful, deep burgundy foliage throughout the season and small white-pink clusters of flowers in early Summer.
- Mountain Ninebark (Physocarpus monogynu) Ht 3-4', Spd 3-4'
 - Compact native shrub with medium green foliage. Clusters of ¼-½" white flowers, tinged with rose, appear in early Summer. Bark is exfoliating. Orange to red Fall color. Effective for massing and low hedging.
 - Summer Wine (Physocarpus opulifolius 'Summer Wine') Ht 5-6', Spd 5-6'
 - A new improved Ninebark, combines the fine texture and compact branching of 'Nana' with the dark foliage of Diabolo. Pinkish-white button-like flowers in early Summer.
- > Tiny Wine (Physocarpus opulifolius 'Tiny Wine®') Ht 3-4', Spd 3-4'
 - A new dwarf variety, smaller than others on the market, yet extra full with small, refined leaves. The dark bronze-maroon foliage is colorful all season and contrasts beautifully with soft pink and white flowers early Summer. The dainty flowers cover the stems, providing an exceptionally showy display. This durable shrub is perfect for season-long color in the landscape and is a great choice for patio containers. Adaptable to most soils. Prune after blooming, only if needed; ninebarks look best when not regularly pruned.

PEASHRUB, 'Assorted Variety' (Caragana) Full sun. Drought tolerant once established. (XERIC)

- Creeping (Caragana arborescens 'Pendula') Ht 2-5', Spd 6-18'
 - Bright green pinnately compound leaves cascade along arching branches. Can be used in harsh, exposed areas for mass plantings. Yellow pea-like flowers are partially hidden when they bloom in Spring followed by small pods. Adaptable to poor sites and most soil conditions.
- Globe (Caragana frutex 'Globosa') Ht 2-3', Spd 2-3'
 - This small, slow-growing, dense shrub does not sucker. Useful as a low formal hedge or small specimen. The tight, round shape and soft light green foliage gives a boxwood like appearance in Summer.
- Pygmy (Caragana pygmaea) Ht 3-4', Spd 3-4'
 - The fine textured, graceful foliage of Pygmy is a lighter green than globe peashrub. Small yellow flowers late Spring. Very hardy. One of the best shrubs for the Plains area of the Northwest. Use as a foundation plant, a low informal shrub, or a clipped hedge.
- Siberian (Caragana arborescens) Ht 12-15', Spd 8-10'
 - Pinnately compound bright green leaves emerge on copper-green branches in Spring. Showy, yellow, pea-like flowers appear in late Spring followed by pealike pods. Excellent as screen, hedge, or windbreak, but will become open at base as plant ages. Tolerant of a wide range of soil types.
- Sutherland (Caragana arborescens 'Sutherland') Ht 12-20', Spd 4-6'
 - A unique fastigiate form of *C. arborescens* found at the Cheyenne Research Station. An extremely hard columnar shrub (or small tree) that could be used for screens or strong vertical statements in the landscape. Glossy sienna brown bark adds winter interest. Yellow, pea-like flowers appear in late Spring. Tidy (*Caragana microphylla 'Tidy'*) Ht 4-8', Spd 4-8'
 - Medium-sized, spreading large shrub (or small tree) with upright branches, narrow bright green foliage and an open growth habit. 'Tidy' has an airy southwestern look and was selected for reduced suckering which lends it perfectly for a courtyard. Yellow, pea-like flowers in Spring. Very hardy.

POTENTILLA, 'Assorted Variety' (Potentilla fruticose) Full sun to part shade, low to moderate water needs.

- > Abbotswood (Potentilla fruticosa 'Abbotswood') Ht 2-4', Spd 2-4'
- Green foliage with large, pure white flowers from Spring to Fall. Dense growth habit. Makes a fine foundation plant. One of the best white potentillas.
- Bella Bellissima (Potentilla fruticosa 'Hachliss', USPP#27715) Ht 2-3', Spd 3-4' The Bella Bellissima Potentilla is a beautiful compact shrub. An easy to grow, cold-hardy plant with long lasting blooms that deepen in color with age. Radiant pink flowers appear top to bottom from Spring to Fall.
- Bella Bianca (*Potentilla fruticose 'Bella Bianca'*) Ht 1-2', Spd 1-2'
- A tidy shrub to please all season! Stellar, white flowers cover this dainty specimen, adding class and sweetness to any landscape.
- Colorado Sunshine (Potentilla fruticosa 'Colorado Sunshine) Ht 3-4', Spd 3-4'
 - A compact and finely textured shrub, that stands out when compared to other Potentillas due to its blue-green leaves and bright yellow flowers that appear from Spring to Fall. Brings a pop of color to the landscape.
- > Dakota Sunspot (Potentilla fruticosa 'Fargo') Ht 2-3', Spd 3-4'

Compact variety with deep golden 1" flowers produced profusely from Spring to Fall. Dwarf plant with large flowers.

- Forever Gold (Potentilla fruticosa var. 'prudomnii') Ht 2-3', Spd 2-3'
 - A selection from the Cheyenne Experimental Station. A potentilla having an erect habit with leaves that are light green above and gray-green below. Pale yellow flowers from Spring to Fall. An early flowering variety with one of the longest and most profuse bloom periods of any potentilla.
- Gold Drop (Potentilla fruticosa 'Gold Drop') Ht 2-4', Spd 2-3'
- A compact and finely textured potentilla. Abundant 1" bright yellow flowers, on medium green foliage, blooms steadily from Spring to Fall. Goldfinger (Potentilla fruticosa 'Goldfinger') Ht 3-5' Spd 3-5'
 - An improved variety with an erect habit and consistent bloom cycle. The 1.5" golden-yellow flowers from Spring to Fall. Medium green foliage. The best tall-growing, bright yellow potentilla to date.
- Gold Star (Potentilla fruticosa 'Gold star' #5 14785) Ht 2-3' Spd 2-3'
- Good shrub for foundation plantings or for small areas. This Potentilla has one of the largest flowers.
- Jackman (Potentilla fruticosa 'Jackman') Ht 3-5', Spd 3-5'
- Larger leaf than other potentillas with a more upright habit. Dark green foliage. Bright golden-yellow 1.5" blooms Spring to Fall. One of the most attractive potentillas in the collection at the USDA Experimental Station in Cheyenne.
- Katherine Dykes (Potentilla fruticosa 'Katherine Dykes') Ht 2-3', Spd 3-4' ۶ A potentilla with a wide spreading habit and gray-green foliage. Blooms Spring to Fall. The pale-yellow flowers are striking against the gray-green pubescent foliage.
- Mango Tango (Potentilla fruticose 'Mango Tango') Ht 1-2', Spd 1-2'
 - This densely growing shrub is ideal for rustic landscapes. The showy orange and yellow flowers supplement any flower bed, border or accent planting. Extremely cold hardy and easy to care for.
- McKay's White (Potentilla fruticosa 'McKay's White') Ht 2', Spd 3' ۶
- A mound-shaped potentilla. White to creamy-white flowers from Spring to Fall. Dark-green foliage stays clean throughout the season.
- Pink Beauty (Potentilla fruticosa 'Pink Beauty') Ht 3-4', Spd 3-4'
 - Foliage is bright green and lush. Pink flowers Spring to Fall. These perform best when used on an eastern exposure.
- Prairie Snow (Potentilla fruticosa va. 'davurica') Ht 1-2', Spd 3-6'
 - The parent plant is located at the USDA Experimental Station in Cheyenne. It is nearly fifty years old, about 2' tall and 6' wide. When in bloom it is a striking mound of white flowers. Blooms Spring to Fall. This plant is tough and long lived. Bright green foliage gives it a lush look when out of bloom. Snowbird (Potentilla fruticosa 'Snowbird') Ht 2 .5-4', Spd 2-4'
- A potentilla with an upright compact form and bright green glossy foliage. Approximately 80% of the blooms have a double row of petals, which become more abundant on older plants. Blooms Spring to Fall.
- Bella Sol (Potentilla fruticosa 'Hachdon', USPP#27685) Ht 2-3', Spd 2-3'
- A petite mounded shrub with medium green foliage and long-lasting apricot blooms from Spring to Fall. An easy to grow, cold-hardy shrub.
- Tangerine (Potentilla fruticosa 'Tangerine') Ht 2-4', Spd 2-4'

The dense foliage spreads horizontally across the ground slowly producing a thick mat. They are virtually pest free. The Tangerine variety is wide spreading with layered branches. The flowers are bright yellow in full sun but become orange in cool weather or partial shade. The shrub flowers from early Spring to late Fall and should be pruned back every 2 to 3 years to rejuvenate the plant.

Yellow Gem (Potentilla fruticosa 'Yellow Gem') Ht 1-2', Spd 3-6'

A Potentilla with a unique procumbent habit ideal for the rock garden. The new twig growth is red contrasting with the pubescent gray-green foliage. Bright yellow flowers all Summer.

PRIVET, 'Assorted Variety' (Ligustrum) Full sun to part shade, low to moderate water needs.

Cheyenne (Ligustrum vulgare 'Cheyenne') Ht 8-16', Spd 4-8' ۶

Dark green foliage is an attractive feature of this plant. Upright, rapid grower with extremely fragrant clusters of small white flowers in early Summer followed by blue to black berries that are not edible. An excellent shrub for screens and formal hedges.

- Golden Ticket (Ligustrum x vicarvi 'NCLX1' USPP 27,301) Ht 4-6', Spd 4-5'
 - Bright, glossy gold foliage forms a dense leafy wall that creates privacy. Ideal for low-maintenance hedges. Clusters of white flowers perfume the air in Summer.
- Golden Vicary (Ligustrum x vicary) Ht 4-6', Spd 4-5'

Bright golden foliage that holds late into Fall and Winter. Fragrant white flowers early Summer followed by purple berries. Growth habit is somewhat vaseshaped. Foliage will be a golden-yellow the entire growing season, if the plant is grown in a sunny location. Ideal as a hedge or contrast plant.

- Lodense (Ligustrum vulgare 'Lodense') Ht 3-5', Spd 2-4' A low-growing hedge plant that makes a great formal look. Glossy, green foliage holds on well late into the season, though it has no significant Fall color. Very compact, dense, slow growth keeps this plant in bounds.
- New Mexican (Forestiera neomexicana) Ht 8-15', Spd 8-12' (XERIC)

Small yellow flowers appear before leaves, followed by 0.8" dark blue fruit in late Fall. The fruit is usually consumed by birds. Silky smooth blond bark adds interest when lower branches are removed to create a small multi-stemmed tree. Native to the southern Rock Mountain region. A great aspen alternative.

RABBITBRUSH, 'Assorted Varitey' (Chrysothamnus nauseosus) Full sun. Drought tolerant once established. (XERIC)

- Dwarf Blue (Chrysothamnus nauseosus var. nauseosus) Ht 1-4', Spd 2-4'
- Smaller, more compact form of rabbitbrush with blue-gray leaf color. Fall brings bright yellow flowers. Tolerant of poor soils and high winds. Tall Blue (Chrysothamnus nauseosus albicaulis) Ht 4-6', Spd 4-6' ۶
- Bushy, semi-evergreen native shrub with thin blue-green leaves and showy golden-yellow flower clusters in Fall. Tolerates poor soils and grows naturally in very dry sites. ≻
 - Tall Green (Chrysothamnus nauseosus graveolens) Ht 4-6', Spd 4-6'
 - A Rabbitbrush with a brighter green leaf color than the Tall Blue Rabbitbrush. Tolerates poor soils and grows naturally in very dry sites.

ROSE, 'Assorted Variety' (Rosa) Full sun, low to moderate water needs. MANY VARIETIES AVAILABLE. ASK ABOUT AVAILABILTY.

Adelaide Hoodless (Rosa x 'Adelaide Hoodless') Ht 4-5', Spd 4-6' \geq

This rose is from the Parkland Series. It is an extremely floriferous and vigorous shrub rose. Flowers in clusters of up to 25, slightly fragrant, semi-double red blooms. The fine-textured, glossy, dark green foliage appears on arching stems. It is resistant to mildew. The blossoms are recurrent.

Austrian Copper (Rosa foetida 'Bicolor') Ht 6-8', Spd 4-6'

Easily recognized shrub rose with single coppery-red and yellow bi-color flowers. This tall, upright plant blooms with large, flowering masses in early Summer. A rose that has been enjoyed in gardens in Europe since the 1500's. Some branches may produce all yellow blooms resulting in both yellow and coppery-red blooms. A hardy specimen. Blooms once a season.

Blaze (Rosa 'Blaze') Ht 10-15'

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This is one of the best climbing red roses. The scarlet blossoms are a neatly cupped form opening to a fairly full-petal bloom with a light fruity fragrance. The blossoms appear in large clusters on strong canes. The bloom time is usually from early Summer to Fall.

Bonica (Rosa x'Bonica' (PP5,105)) Ht 3-5', Spd 4-5'

Masses of pale pink double flowers bloom throughout the Summer on sturdy arching stems. Glossy, dark green foliage. Bright orange-red hips last into Winter. Winner of the prestigious All-American Rose Selection award in 1987. Ever-blooming.

Carefree Celebration (Rosa carefree celebration) Ht 4-5', Spd 4-5'

- This shrub rose has cup-like double blooms with dazzling shades of orange, orange-red, and peach. This is an everblooming rose blooming from late Spring to Fall. The matte foliage is a medium green color. This plant has excellent disease resistance.
- Carefree Delight (Rosa 'Carefree Delight') Ht 5', Spd 5'

Single-blooming, pink flowers cover this shrub in the Summer, adding a touch of feminine delicacy to your landscape design. Showy red hips displayed from mid to late Fall.

Carefree Sunshine (Rosa 'RADsun' (PP 13,063)) Ht 3-4', Spd 3-4'

A new everblooming shrub rose with bright, non-fading, single lemon-yellow blooms. The flowers get up to 3 ½" across. This shrub rose is very disease resistant. It has glossy medium green foliage.

Campfire (Rosa 'Campfire') Ht 2-3', Spd 3-4'

The Campfire Rose has a beautiful yellow bud with red tones that opens to clusters of semi-double, yellow flowers edged with deep pink. The pink edges darken as the season progresses. The flowers are a striking contrast to the dark green leaves. The Campfire Rose blooms well until the frost.

> Darlow's Enigma (*Rosa x 'Darlow's Enigma'*) Ht 4-6', Spd 4-6'

A lovely heirloom rose of unknown origin. Two-inch white blooms are borne in clusters of 20 or more and have a very intense rose fragrance with a hint of citrus. The single to semi-double blooms open to expose a golden yellow center, and are accented by beautiful glossy, dark green foliage. This rose tolerates alkaline soils. The habit is shrub-like to rambling. Recurrent.

Double Knockout (Rosa x 'Radtko' P.P.# 16202) Ht 3-4', Spd 3-4'

The Double Knock Out Rose is a low maintenance shrub rose that produces showy candy apple red blossoms that have a spicy scent. This rose makes a beautiful accent shrub or hedge. It has excellent resistance to downy mildew leaf disease and black spot.

- Golden Showers (Rosa x 'Golden Showers') Ht 6-12', Spd 3-5'
 - This rose has elegant buds opening to a semi-double flower with a mild licorice scent. The flowers appear bright yellow fading to light cream color with loosely ruffled petals. Deep green glossy leaves grow on thorny canes. Recurrent bloomer.
- Golden Wings (*Rosa x 'Golden Wings'*) Ht 4-6', Spd 4-5'

A large shrub rose that blooms throughout the season with single yellow blooms. The flowers often reach 4-5" in diameter and have a spicy fragrance.

Hansa (Rosa x 'Hansa') Ht 4-5', Spd 5-7'

This is a rugosa hybrid, a vigorous shrub rose with unique, fuchsia-pink blooms having sweet fragrance. Medium, glossy green foliage gives this plant a nice texture. Large, tasty red hips ripen after flowers fade in the Fall. Recurrent bloomer.

Harrison's Yellow (Rosa foetida × harisonii) Ht 3-6', Spd 3-6'

An heirloom cultivar introduced in the 1820's and now naturalized throughout the USA, known as the "Oregon Trail Rose" and also the "Yellow Rose of Texas," tolerates drought, shade, and poorer soils. Clusters of clear yellow, semi-double blooms. Requires little care and is very Winter hardy. Lovely when planted as a single specimen plant, in groups or as an informal hedge.

Henry Kelsey (Rosa x 'Henry Kelsey') Ht 6-8', Spd 5-6'

Explorer series A pillar type rose with trailing branches. Flowers are medium red with a bright yellow center. Spicy fragrant blooms are borne in clusters of 9-15 flowers with up to 25 petals each. Removal of old flowers encourages repeat blooming. Branches can be left up on a trellis with only minor Spring pruning. Recurrent.

High Voltage (Rosa 'High Voltage') Ht 4-5', Spd 2-3'

Beautiful clusters of double yellow blossoms held high on sturdy stems in Summer. Clean foliage complements the fragrant blooms. This shrub rose grows in an upright, vase shape.

Hope for Humanity (Rosa x 'Hope for Humanity') Ht 3-4', Spd 3-4'

This low growing rose has striking, double 3" deep red blooms, and medium green, glossy, disease resistant, foliage. It was named in honor of the 100th anniversary of the Canadian Red Cross Society. It is an everblooming rose.

Iceberg (Rosa 'Iceberg Climbing') Ht 12-15', Spd 7-9' This rose is a very successful climbing sport of Flori

This rose is a very successful climbing sport of Floribundas. The semi-double white blooms have a gentle honey scent and the stems can easily be trained over arches or other structures.

Jeanne Lajoie (Rosa 'Jeanne Lajoie') Ht 6-10', Spd 3-6'

This is a miniature climbing rose with fully double pink roses and deep green foliage. The small flowers bloom profusely throughout the growing season. The have a soft tea fragrance. These can also be used as a self-supporting shrub.

John Cabot (Rosa x 'John Cabot') Ht 8-10', Spd 3-4'

This explorer series rose is a pillar type with strong arching canes up to 10' tall. This plant can be grown as a pillar or a climber. Some pruning is required. Double, 2 ½'' fuschia-pink blooms appear throughout the Summer. This is a recurrent rose.

- Knock Out (Rosa x 'RADrazz' (PP11836)) Ht 3-4', Spd 3-4' 2000 AARS winner. Deep red buds open to large, single, cherry-like blossoms. The very disease resistant foliage is dark green tinged with burgundy. Bright orange-red hips add great Fall interest. Everblooming.
- Linda Campbell (Rosa x 'Linda Campbell' (PP8199)) Ht 5', Spd 5-6'
- Rugosa hybrid Dark velvety red semi-double blooms, 2 ½" across are borne in clusters throughout the Summer till frost. Arching habit. Recurrent. Morden Blush (*Rosa x 'Morden Blush'* (*PP8,054*)) Ht 2-3', Spd 2-3'
- A compact, hardy shrub rose that blooms with beautiful, double pale pink flowers from early Summer until frost. The blooms may fade to ivory in hot weather. Tolerant of alkaline soils.
- Morden Centennial (Rosa x 'Morden Centinnial') Ht 4-6', Spd 4-6'
 - Parkland series Large, 4" medium pink double flowers with a light fragrance. One of the best producers of showy orange hips in Fall. Excellent disease resistance and attractive foliage. Recurrent.
- Morden Fireglow (Rosa x 'Morden Fireglow') Ht 2-3', Spd 2-3'

Parkland series: Features clusters of 2-3" fiery orange-red flowers with a beautiful scarlet reverse. Excellent disease resistance and attractive foliage. Recurrent bloomer.

- Morden Sunrise (*Rosa x 'Morden Sunrise'*) Ht 3-4', Spd 3-4'
 - Parkland series This is the first orange blend flowering member of the Parkland series. Bright yellow-orange buds open to 3", fragrant, semi-double blooms with a yellow petal base that blends to orange at the petal tip. Dark green glossy foliage with improved resistance to blackspot. Everblooming.
- Nearly Wild (Rosa x 'Nearly Wild') Ht 2-3', Spd 3-5'
 - Shrub rose with fragrant, 2-2 ^{1/2}" single pink flowers throughout the Summer until frost. Attractive plant with a bushy habit. Vigorous and disease resistant. Useful in mass plantings as a ground cover. Everblooming.
- So Easy (Rosa 'Chewmaytime') Ht 1-2', Spd 1-2'
 - This attractive and fragrant rose attracts butterflies with its bright, paprika-colored blooms. Its dark, glossy leaves emerge lightly tinged with red. Highly disease resistant. One of the most cold-hardy.
- > Paint the Town (Rosa 'Paint the Town') Ht 2-3', Spd 2-3'
- Beautiful clusters of medium red blooms cover the plant. It looks fantastic with the contrast of the dark green foliage. Very disease resistant.
- Red Cascade (Rosa 'Red Cascade') Ht 5', Spd 5-8' This rose has tight dustars of fully double
 - This rose has tight clusters of fully double, dark red blossoms. The leaves are dark green. The blossoms have a mild fragrance. This rose can be used as a climber or trained as a hedge.
- Redleaf (Rosa glauca (rubrifolia)) Ht 4-6', Spd 5-7'
 - This rose has an attractive foliage that is purple in sunny locations turning a gray-green with a mauve tinge in shadier locations. The stems are a red-violet color. It has very fragrant light pink 1 ¹/₂" flowers in Summer followed by bright red hips that hold into Winter. This a non-recurrent rose.
- Ruby Voodoo (Rosa 'Ruby Voodoo') Ht 5-6', Spd 4-5'
 - This rose has a large upright form that works great in pairings of taller grasses and other roses. Very fragrant purple pink flowers that have a recurring bloom through most of the Summer. A great specimen to add some vibrant color and fragrance to your garden!
- Sea Foam (Rosa x 'Sea Foam') Ht 2-3', Spd 3-5'
- Glossy, dark green, disease resistant foliage. Double white blooms have a light fragrance. Recurrent.
- Sunny Knockout (Rosa x 'Radsunny' (PP18562)) Ht 3-4', Spd 3-4'
 - The Sunny Knock Out Rose makes a beautiful hedge. The flowers appear bright yellow fading to a cream color and bloom profusely. This shrub rose has great disease resistance.
- Sunrise Sunset (Rosa x 'BAIset' (PP 16,770)) Ht 2-3', Spd 3-5'
 - As the name implies, Sunrise Sunset is a stunning blend, with bright fuchsia-pink petals, blending to apricot near the centers. Blue-green foliage is diseaseresistant on this everblooming shrub rose. Its dense, spreading habit makes it an ideal ground cover and it is also well suited to mass plantings.
 - The Fairy (Rosa x 'The Fairy') Ht 2-3', Spd 3-4'
 - A small rose found as a sport of 'Lady Godiva' in 1932. This rose makes a nice groundcover. It has profuse double pink flowers, 1"-1 ½" blossoms that will bloom through the Summer. The foliage is a glossy, dark green and disease resistant. This is a recurrent bloomer.
- Therese Bugnet (Rosa x 'Theresa Bugnet') Ht 5-6', Spd 5-6'
 - Dark red buds open to 2" double pink fragrant flowers. Attractive blue-green foliage. This rose is great for a hedge, with recurrent blossoms and blooms on old wood. Extremely hardy and totally disease resistant. 'Thérése Bugnet' was bred for the harsh Winters of Canada, which it withstands well, but it is equally at home in much warmer areas.
- Westerland (Rosa 'Westerland') Ht 8', Spd 4'
- This rose produces fragrant double apricot-orange flowers in clusters. It has large, dark green, soft leaves. Can be used as a climber or as a shrub.
- William Baffin (Rosa x 'William Baffin') Ht 8-10', Spd 6-8'
 - Produces deep pink, semi double flowers that are semi fragrant. They repeat blooms more sporadically until frost. Blooms on new wood; prune in late Winter to early Spring to promote new growth.
- Winnipeg Parks (Rosa x 'Winnipeg Parks' (PP9122)) Ht 3-4', Spd 3-4'
 - The pointed buds of this Parkland rose are borne in small clusters of deep pinkish-red and open to dark cherry pink flowers with a dark pink reverse. The slightly fragrant flowers age to dark pink backed by matte green foliage that takes on a reddish tinge in Fall. With a bonus of red hips, this compact, low growing rose is a beauty.
- Woods (*Rosa woodsia*) Ht 3-5', Spd 4-6'
 - Arching shrub with delicate, fragrant, single pink flowers in Summer followed by small, red rose hips that hold on into Winter. Spreads to form dense thickets. Develops an orange to red Fall color. A Rocky Mountain native. Nonrecurrent.

SANDCHERRY, 'Assorted Variety' (Prunus besseyi). Full sun, low to moderate water needs.

- > Pawnee Buttes (Prunus besseyi 'Pawnee Buttes') Ht 12-18", Spd 6-8"
- Differs from the species in that is has a low, creeping form. Parent plant was discovered near Pawnee Buttes in eastern Colorado. Plant Select 2000. Western (*Prunus besseyi*) Ht 5-6', Spd 5-6'
 - Masses of single white flowers in Spring are followed by edible ³/₄" black cherries, great for attracting birds. Showy, glossy silver-green foliage turns to a soft red in Fall. Prefers hot, dry conditions.

SERVICEBERRY, 'Assorted Variety' (Amelanchier) Full sun to part shade, low to moderate water needs.

- > Autumn Brilliance (Amelanchier x grandiflora 'Autumn Brilliance') Ht 20-25', Spd 15-20'
 - Rounded growth habit with moderately spreading branches. Clusters of showy white flowers appear in Spring, followed by a tasty purplish-black fruit. Fall color is bright orange-red. Strong branching resists ice and snow breakage. Can be grown in a small single stem, or attractive multi-stemmed tree. **Regent (Amelanchier alnifolia 'Regent')** Ht 4-6', Spd 4-6'
 - This is a selection of the Saskatoon Serviceberry that has a larger and heavier fruit set. The large white flowers appear in Spring before the leaves completely emerge. The edible fruit is blueberry-like in appearance and ripens in early Summer. This plant has a flashy orange to red Fall color.
- Saskatoon (Amelanchier alnifolia) Ht 10-12', Spd 6-8' (XERIC)
 - Elegant mountain native with billowy cluster of white flowers in Spring followed by edible blueberry-like fruit. Green foliage turns yellow to red in Fall. Good for attracting birds. Can be grown as a large shrub or multi-stemmed small tree. A good specimen for dry, alkaline, soils.

- Shadblow (Amelanchier canadensis) Ht 6-20', Spd 8-12'
 - Large shrub or small tree. There is a great variation in size within the species. Showy white flowers appear in early Spring before foliage. Purplish-black berries were favorites of Native American tribes. Good yellow to red Fall color.
- Standing Ovation (Amelanchier alnifolia 'Standing Ovation') Ht 12-15', Spd 4-6'
 - Blooms profusely, giving it a similar appearance to a dogwood shrub. Produces small, edible berries tasting very like blueberries and are perfect for preserves. The orange and red Fall colors give your yard bright seasonal interest.
- Utah (Amelanchier utahensis) Ht 6-12', Spd 6-8' (XERIC)

A rounded shrub native to the Western Slope of Colorado, Utah, Arizona, and Texas. Blanketed with fragrant white flowers in early Spring followed by wooly gray-green leaves. Yellow fruit ripens and dries to bluish-black in mid-Summer. Tolerant of heat and drought

SMOKEBUSH, ROYAL PURPLE (Cotinus coggygria 'Royal Purple') Ht 8-10', Spd 8-10' Full sun to part shade, low to moderate water needs.

Handsome, oval purple leaves on this large shrub are interesting enough, but the clouds of tiny beige flowers that resemble puffs of 'smoke' in mid-Summer make this plant stand out. Subject to Winter dieback, though it recovers quickly to make a fine plant each year. Best in a protected location.

SNOWBERRY (Symphoricarpos albus) Ht 4-5', Spd 5-7' Full sun to part shade, low to moderate water needs.

Petite pink flowers appear against blue-green foliage in early Summer, followed by showy ³/4" white berries which hold into Winter. Useful for wildlife habitat. Arching, spreading growth habit. Suckers profusely which creates problems in the wrong situation, or helpful in holding soil on steep banks.

SPIREA, 'Assorted Variety' (Spiraea) Full sun to part shade, low to moderate water needs.

- > Anthony Waterer (Spiraea japonica 'Anthony Waterer') Ht 3', Spd 3'
- Dark pink flowers in early Summer. Useful as a small hedge with good Fall color.
- Cheyenne Snowmound (Spiraea nipponica var. tosaensis) Ht 3-5', Spd 3-5
- Similar to "Snowmound" with slightly smaller flowers and larger leaves. The hardiest of all the nipponicas. Survived well at the Cheyenne station. > Daphne (*Spiraea japonica 'Alpina'*) Ht 1-2', Spd 3-4'
 - Spirea that forms a low spreading mat of slender, dense branches covered by medium green small leaves. Clusters of light pink flowers are borne in corymbs mid-Summer. An attractive fine-textured groundcover.
- Double Play Gold (Spirea japonica 'Yan') Ht 18"-2, Spd 2-3' Double Play Spirea has bright hot pink flowers and vibrant golden foliage, giving season-long color. A compact and low mounding shrub. Deadhead after flowering to encourage reblooming.
- > Double Play Red (Spirea japonica 'SMNSJMFR'#26,993) Ht 1-3', Spd 1-3'
 - The double play of color takes place as rich burgundy foliage emerges in Spring, followed by crimson-red blooms. Bringing butterflies and bees throughout the season. Even hummingbirds don't mind an occasional sip of their nectar!
- Fairy Queen (Spiraea trilobata 'Fairy Queen') Ht 3-4', Spd 3-4'
 - A compact spirea with dark green lobed leaves. Profuse flat-topped flowers in Summer. Resembles a compact form of VanHoute Spirea. Develops an attractive red Fall color.
- Fritsch Spirea (Spiraea fritschiana) Ht 3', Spd 3'

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- A compact and densely growing flowering shrub. Beautiful flowers late Spring early Summer. Stunning Fall color.
- Froebel (Spiraea x bumalda 'Froebeli') Ht 3-4', Spd 3-4'
 - This low growing shrub boasts flat clusters of pink flowers in Summer. Good for hedge or foundation planting. New foliage appears as purplish tips on a green background. Purplish red Fall color. Best when pruned back for flowering each Spring. Stays more compact than the Anthony Water Spirea. Glow Girl (*Spirea betulifolia 'Glow Girl*) Ht 3-4', Spd 3-4'
 - The Glow Girl Spirea has a beautiful yellow foliage. The flower buds appear with hints of red opening to a white flower in the Summer. It is a very hardy compact plant with seasonal colors for your landscape.
- Goldflame (Spiraea x bumalda 'Goldflame') Ht 2-3', Spd 2-3'
 - Spring foliage is bright gold with red tips, turning yellow green in the Summer. Coppery-orange Fall color. Dark pink flower clusters in Summer. Great foundation or border plant with many accenting color changes throughout the season.
- Goldmound (Spiraea x bumalda 'Gold Mound') Ht 1-2', Spd 2-3'
 - Bushy, mounding shrub with yellow-gold leaves throughout the season. Pink flowers in Summer. Good for accent or contrast in a foundation planting or shrub border.
- Grefshiem (Spiraea cineria 'Grefsheim') Ht 4-5', Spd 4-6'
 - A dense shrub with finely textured narrow gray-green leaves. Has an arching habit that ultimately becomes broader than it is tall. In late Spring there are cascades of abundant small white flowers that bloom all along the branches. An excellent medium sized shrub.
 - Gumball (Spiraea x bumalda 'Gumball') Ht 2-2.5', Spd 3-4'
 - A compact selection of Froebel Spirea that keeps its dense rounded shape even under the weight of blooms. Dark pink flower clusters bloom in early Summer against medium green foliage. An overall superior form of Summer spirea.
- Little Princess (Spiraea japonica 'Little Princess') Ht1-2', Spd 2-3'
 - Small, dense shrub with slender branches and medium green foliage. Good border or specimen plant with a dainty, fine texture. Corymbs of dark rose flowers bloom in early Summer. Purplish red Fall color.
- Magic Carpet (Spiraea japonica 'Magic Carpet' (PP 9,363)) Ht 15-18", Spd 24-30".
 - The new growth emerges red in the Spring and matures into a rich bronze, re-tipped foliage. The clusters of deep pink flowers cover the plant in early Summer and contrast nicely with the leaves. The foliage turns a russet color in the Fall that remains well into Winter.
- Neon Flash (Spiraea japonica 'Neon Flash') Ht 3-4', Spd 3-4'
 - Vivid red flowers grace this attractive spirea in early Summer. The new growth appears with a purple tint, matures to dark green, and then takes on a lovely burgundy color for Fall. Compact rounded habit.
- > Pink Sparkler Birchleaf (Spirea betulifolia 'COURISPI01') Ht 3-4', Spd 3-4'
 - Similar to the Tor Birchleaf Spirea in shape. It has a compact rounded growth habit. Beautiful pink flowers through Summer. Leaves turn burgundy red in the Fall.

- Renaissance (Spiraea x vanhouttei 'Renaissance) Ht 5-7', Spd 6-8'
 - A large spirea with long arching branches that become laden with fragrant cascades of white flowers in Spring, creating a striking display. Dark green lobed leaves. A Vanhoutte Spirea selected for its more disease resistant foliage.
- Shirobana (Spirea x japonica 'Shirobana') Ht 2-2.5', Spd 3-4' >
 - With its handsome mounding habit, the Shirobana is perfect for use as a foundation or garden border. The multi-colored flower clusters will give your landscape a stunning pop. Regular pruning of expired flower heads will prolong the flowering period.
- Snowmound (Spiraea nipponica 'Snowmound') Ht 3-5', Spd 3-5'

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- Produces profuse clusters of pure white flowers in Spring against small dark green leaves. Dense, mounding habit with fine texture.
- Tor Birchleaf (Spiraea betulifolia 'Tor') Ht 3-4', Spd 3-4' The Tor Birchleaf Spirea is a great choice for planting along a sidewalk or foundation. It has a compact rounded growth habit. The foliage has a gorgeous green color that turns to a mix of gold, red, and purple in the Fall. The tight clusters of white flowers appear in the Spring.

SPIREA, 'Assorted Variety' (Caryopteris) Full sun to part shade. Drought tolerant once established. (XERIC)

- Blue Mist (Caryopteris x clandonensis 'Blue Mist') Ht 2-4', Spd 2-3' ۶
- Soft, silvery-green foliage and upright branches. Light blue flowers appear mid to late Summer. A beautiful xeric addition to any landscape.
- Dark Knight (Caryopteris x clandonensis 'Dark Knight') Ht 3-5', Spd 2-3'
- Form of Blue Mist Spirea with darker gray-green foliage and darker blue flowers. Valued for late Summer to Fall flowers.
 - Dwarf Yellow Blue Mist (Caryopteris x clandonensis 'Dwarf Yellow') Ht 2-3', Spd 2-3'

A smaller version of the standard Blue Mist Spirea. This shrub has showy yellow foliage contrasting against the blue/purple blooms all Summer.

WEIGELA, 'Assorted Variety' (Weigela florida) Full sun to part shade, low to moderate water needs.

- ⊳ Date Night Tuxedo (Weigela 'Velda') Ht 2-3', Spd 3-4'
 - It's compact form and striking contrast between dark foliage and white flowers make this an exceptional addition to your landscape. Hardy to -30°F. A bee and butterfly magnet!
- Dropmore Pink (Weigela florida 'Dropmore Pink') Ht 4-6', Spd 4-6'
- A hardy weigela introduced form the Morden Research Station in Canada. Dark green Summer foliage and trumpet-shaped rose-pink flowers in Summer. Fine Wine (Weigela florida 'Fine Wine') Ht 2-4', Spd 2-3'
 - This weigela has beautiful dark foliage that contrasts with the deep pink flowers. It grows in a tight upright form that sometimes falls open in the center. It's great for a smaller weigela.
- Midnight Wine (Weigela florida 'Elvera' (PP12217)) Ht 12-18", Spd 18-24"

The Midnight Wine Weigela is a compact growing shrub. It has beautiful light pink flowers in the Spring and burgundy-purple leaves. It is a great alternative to the crimson pygmy barberry.

- Red Prince (Weigela florida 'Red Prince') Ht 4-6', Spd 4-6'
 - A small shrub that is almost as wide as it is tall. The trumpet-shaped flowers demonstrate a rich red color that does not fade. Recurrent flowering if there is sparse late Spring bloom. The leaves are dark green on slender stems with a coarse Winter texture. This shrub is useful in mass plantings or a background.
- Sonic Bloom Weigela florida 'Verweig 6' (USPP 25, 132) Ht 3-4', Spd 3-4' 2 Strong rebloomer and fills the area with bright pink flowers! No deadheading necessary. Makes a stunning border to any landscape project.
- Tango Weigela (Weigela florida 'Tango') Ht 2-3', Spd 2-3'
 - The Tango Weigela is a more compact grower working well for hedges or foundation plantings. The beautiful flowers appear in the Summer and can be a rosy color to a red color. The foliage is a green with purple tint.
- Wine & Roses (Weigela florida 'Alexandra' (PP10772)) Ht 4-5', Spd 3-5' ⊳
 - A low growing rounded shrub. Notable for its very dark burgundy-purple foliage. Dark pink flowers show off against the foliage in early Summer.

EVERGREEN SHRUBS

JUNIPER, 'Assorted Variety' (Juniperus) Full sun. Drought tolerant once established. (XERIC)

Andorra (Juniperus horizontalis 'Plumosa Compacta Youngstown') Ht 1-2', Spd 6-10' ⊳

The Compact Andorra Juniper is a great groundcover. Tight branching form with a dense center. Bright gray-green foliage turns an attractive plum color in the Winter months.

- Arcadia (Juniperus sabina 'Arcadia') Ht 2-3'. Spd 6-10'
- Bright, green, lacy, scale-like foliage, with a tiered horizontal habit. Resistant to juniper blight. 2
 - Armstrong (Juniperus chinensis 'Armstrongii') Ht 4-5', Spd 8-12'
 - The gray-green foliage has a fine lacy texture and holds its color well in the Winter. The branching form is horizontal with a slight arch. Selected by Armstrong Nurseries in 1932.
- Bar Harbor (Juniperus horizontalis 'Bar Harbor') Ht 6-12", Spd 6-10'
 - A low growing spreading form that hugs the ground. Summer foliage is a soft gray-blue becoming a silvery plum color in Winter.
- Blue Chip (Juniperus horizontalis 'Blue Chip') Ht 8-12", Spd 6-10'
- Blue foliage on a prostrate spreader with a high center. The branches are upright, giving a more of a feathery appearance. The Winter color is an attractive silvery plum-purple.
- Blue Star (Juniperus squamata 'Blue Star') Ht 2-3', Spd 6-10' >
 - A very attractive dwarf juniper useful in rock gardens. It has an irregular growth habit with spreading and mounding branches. It is a very slow growing juniper. The steel blue awl-shaped needles are star-like in appearance. It needs protection from intense Winter sun.
- Broadmoor (Juniperus sabina 'Broadmoor') Ht 1-2', Spd 6-10'

Bright green foliage. Dense mounding form with horizontally spreading branches that make an interesting ground cover.

- Buffalo (Juniperus sabina 'Buffalo') Ht 1-2', Spd 6-10' ۶
 - Feathery, bright green foliage. Mounding habit. Female Buffalo shrubs produce attractive blue berries. Probably one of the most planted junipers on the face of the earth.

- Calgary Carpet (Juniperus Sabina 'Monna') Ht 1-2', Spd 6-10'
- Low growing, broad spreading selection with light green, feathery foliage. The branches radiate out from the center of the plant creating a spray effect. Compact Pfitzer (Juniperus chinensis 'Pfiteriana Compacta') Ht 3-4', Spd 6-12'
- Medium, compact, spreading Pfitzer with light green awl-like foliage. Dense form with lower, more horizontally spreading branches then other Pfitzers. One of the prickliest Pfitzers, making it a great choice for traffic control.
- Gold Lace (Juniperus chinensis 'Gold Lace') Ht 3-4', Spd 6-10'
 - This juniper is considered a derivative of the Pfitzer Juniper, but doesn't usually get as large. It has a vibrant yellow color with a brighter yellow color in full sun. It is sometimes referred to as the most golden of all junipers. Great plant as a specimen or as mass planting.
- > Gold Tip (Juniperus chinensis 'Pfitzeriana Aurea') Ht 5-8', Spd 8-12

Gray-green foliage with bright, golden yellow new growth tips. A larger and more arching juniper than Old Gold Juniper. Color becomes yellow-green in Winter.

Green Sargent (Juniperus chinesis 'Green Sargent') Ht 2-3', Spd 8-10'

Low spreading, densely branched. A beautiful juniper for our area. This juniper has a soft needle-like foliage with showy blue berries. Great for a ground cover and mass plantings.

Holbert (Juniperus chinensis 'Holbert') Ht 2-4', Spd 6-12'

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Silvery-blue foliage on a low-growing, widely spreading form. Retains its attractiveness throughout the Winter. Mostly scale-type foliate. A beautiful and underused spreader.

Hughes (Juniperus horizontalis 'Hughes') Ht 12-24", Spd 6-12'

Silvery-blue foliage that may develop a light purplish-bronze tint in the Winter. Radial branch pattern. This is a very fast-growing spreader.

> New Blue Tami (Juniperus sabina var. tamariscifolia 'New Blue') Ht 18-24", Spd 6-10'

The New Blue Tami Juniper is bluer in color than the Tami juniper. This plant forms a wide mound that gives a nice variety to the flatter growing junipers. Useful as a specimen for accent, a large-scale groundcover, or for a bank planting.

Old Gold (Juniperus chinensis 'Old Gold') Ht 3-4', Spd 6-12'

A juniper with a compact form, which also boasts a slight graceful arching to the tips of the branches. New growth has a bright golden-yellow color that deepens in the Winter. Full sun will result in its best color.

Prince of Wales (Juniperus horizontalis 'Prince of Wales') Ht 4-6", Spd 6-10'

An attractive low growing, mat forming juniper. It has dense, medium green foliage with a purple cast in the Winter. Center of plant opens with age. Sea Green (Juniperus chinesis 'Sea Green') Ht 5-8', Spd 8-10'

Lush, dark green foliage with fountain-like arching branches. The growth habit is a dense, upright vase-shape. The same juniper as the trademarked plant "Mint Julep".

> Tami (Juniperus sabina var. tamariscifolia) Ht 3-4', Spd 6-10'

Bright medium green foliage in an asymmetrical mound. A good choice for a large-scale ground cover, such as a slopes or foundation planting.

Wilton Spreading (Blue Rug) (Juniperus horizontalis 'Wiltoni') Ht 4-6", Spd 6-10'

Ground hugging, spreading juniper with silver-blue foliage and berries. Foliage turns a purplish color in Winter. Excellent evergreen groundcover for hot, dry areas, and slopes. Will cascade over retaining walls.

PINE, 'Assorted Variety' (Pinus) Full sun. Drought tolerant once established. (XERIC)

> Big Tuna Mugo (Pinus mugo 'Big Tuna') Ht 12-15', Spd 5-6'

A hardy evergreen with a unique dense habit, giving it a bushy appearance. Medium length dark green needles against showy buds give year-round interest and color.

- Columnar Mugo (Pinus mugo 'Columnaris') Ht 8-10', Spd 3-4' This Mugo has a compact columnar growth habit with dark green needles. The buds are coated in a white wax making them standout and giving Winter interest. They can produce ornamental cones.
- Dwarf Mugo (Pinus mugo 'Pumilo') Ht 4-6', Spd 4-8'

Small rounded, multi-stemmed, slow growing evergreen. It maintains an attractive green color throughout all seasons.

La Cabana Mugo (Pinus mugo 'La Cabana') Ht 12-15', Spd 10-12'

The La Cabana Mugo grows in a beautiful pyramidal form with clusters of thick green needles. It is a great choice for a smaller windbreak or even a

specimen tree.
Mops Mugo (*Pinus mugo 'Mops'*) Ht 2.5-3', Spd 2.5-3'

A small and densely compact selection of Mugo Pine. It will not require any candle pruning to keep the compact globe shape. It is a great plant for a rock garden.

- Palouse Mugo (Pinus mugo 'Palouse') Ht 4-6', Spd 4-6'
- A reliable and hardy selection. The long, dark green needles create a bushy appearance. Growing into a larger, rounder shrub.
- Slowmound Mugo (Pinus mugo 'Slowmound) Ht 3-3.5', Spd 3-4'
- This is a dense compact form of Mugo Pine that gets slightly larger than the Mops Mugo. It is a very slow growing pine ideal for tight spots.
- Tannenbaum Mugo (Pinus mugo 'Tannenbaum') Ht 8-10', Spd 5-6' The Tannenbaum Mugo has a pyramidal growth habit. The needles have a beautiful dark green color that sometimes have a hint of blue green. It is a great
 - selection when needing a smaller tree.
 - Tyrolean Mugo (Pinus mugo 'Tyrolean') Ht 4-6', Spd 4-8'
 - Compact, mounding, evergreen shrub with short, stiff, dark green needles. This evergreen used in rock gardens, mass plantings and in groupings. Also makes a great container plant and is excellent for use as a bonsai plant. Has salt tolerance and can withstand some drought.
- Valley Cushion Mugo (Pinus mugo 'Valley Cushion') Ht 1', Spd 4'
 - The Valley Cushion Mugo Pine is a compact, spreading dwarf mugo. It has a very low spreading, almost mat-like habit. It has short, dense dark green needles. The Valley Cushion is a great alternative to the spreading junipers.
 - White Bud Mugo (Pinus mugo 'White Bud') Ht 3-4', Spd 3-6'
 - This is a low mounding mugo selection with dark green needles. This variety is named for the waxy Winter buds that make a bright contrast to the dark foliage. It is a little larger and faster growing than other true-dwarf selections.

SPRUCE, 'Assorted Variety' (Picea) Full sun or part shade, low to moderate water needs.

- Birds Nest (Picea abies 'Nidiformis') Ht 3-4', Spd 4-5'
 - The Birds Nest Spruce is a slow growing dense shrub. It has a finer texture then most spruce. The name 'Birds Nest' comes from the shrubs habit of developing a depression in the middle of the plant. The needles are a green color with more of a lime-green new growth. It will typically keep its branches all

the way to the ground.

- Dwarf Globe (Picea pungens 'Globosa Glauca') Ht 3-5', Spd 5-6'
- Compact, rounded to mound-shaped, with beautiful blue foliage. Valuable as an accent or specimen plant. Very slow growth. Elegans Dwarf (*Picea abies 'Elegans'*) Ht 3-4', Spd 4-6'
 - A dense, low, nest-shaped conifer with dark green foliage. Earlier bud break than Bird's Nest Spruce. Performs best on a North or East exposure.
- Little Gem (Picea abies 'Little Gem') Ht 1-2', Spd 1-2'
- The Little Gem is a perfect small accent spruce! It has green needles with bright green new growth. It is a smaller version of the Bird's Nest Spruce. Mesa Verde (*Picea pungens 'Mesa Verde'*) Ht 10"-1.5', Spd 5-6'

A unique selection of Colorado Spruce with a groundcover habit. Medium green needles on stiff radiating horizontal branches. Will tolerate a full South or West exposure. Great alternative to junipers in areas where a specialty conifer is desired but conditions exclude the shade preferring varieties. Montgomery (*Picea pungens 'Montgomery'*) Ht 4-5', Spd 5-6'

The Montgomery Spruce is a compact shrub with a broad pyramid shape. It has excellent blue color and is slow growing. It is hard to tell apart from the globe spruce as a young plant, but will start to develop a leader as it matures.

Mrs. Cesarini (*Picea pungens 'Mrs. Cesarini'*) Ht 2-3', Spd 3-4' A compact, dense mounded shape with blue-green needles. At maturity is wider than tall. Similar to the Globe Spruce but with green needles instead of blue. Ideal for small spaces.

BROADLEAF EVERGREEN SHRUBS (Require Shade or Part. Cannot tolerate Western Sun Exposure. North or east location preferred.

BOXWOOD, 'Assorted Variety' (Buxus) Part sun to shade, low to moderate water needs.

- Green Beauty (Buxus microphylla var. japonica 'Green Beauty') Ht 3', Spd 3'
 - Perfect for small hedges. Well suited to pruning and shaping. More heat and drought tolerant than other varieties of boxwood. Plant in a more protected area of your yard to shield from high winds, particularly in the Winter.
 - Green Mountain (Buxus 'Wintergreen') Ht 4-5', Spd 3-4'
 - The Green Mountain Boxwood is a more columnar broadleaf evergreen shrub. It has bright green leaves that stay on the plant in the Winter time. It will do best in a protected area out of the wind.
 - Green Velvet (Buxus 'Green Velvet') Ht 3-4', Spd 3-4'

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- The Green Velvet Boxwood maintains its rich green color throughout the Winter. It will maintain the green color best if protected from Winter sun and wind. It has a nice round form when not pruned back.
- > Julia Jane (Buxus microphylla koreana 'Julia Jane') Ht 2.5-3', Spd 3-4'
 - It is similar in appearance to B. microphylla var. koreana. It has been selected for its tolerance to the Front Range environment and its bright green color. It does need protection from the wind and Winter sun.
 - Winter Gem (Buxus microphylla japonica 'Winter Gem') Ht 4-6', Spd 4-6'
 - Excellent evergreen shrub for small hedges. Among the hardiest of boxwoods, the rich green foliage acquires a golden bronze hue through Winter, returning to green in Spring. Evergreen.
- Wintergreen (Buxus microphylla 'Wintergreen') Ht 2-4', Spd 2-4'
 - This is a cold hardy compact boxwood. The oval leaves emerge a light green and darken as they mature. The Wintergreen can be pruned or used as a hedge. It will do best in morning sun, and protection from wind.

EUONYMUS, 'Assorted Variety' (Euonymus fortunei) Part sun to shade, low to moderate water needs.

Blondy (Euonymus fortunei 'Interbolwi') Ht 18-24", Spd 18-24"

Bright yellow leaves with a dark green margin. Tidy, mounded habit does not sprawl like that of other Euonymus varieties, making it an excellent low maintenance plant for mass plantings or along sidewalks. Broadleaf evergreen allows for good Winter color. Able to withstand heavy pruning, ideally done in late Fall. Tolerant of most soil types, excluding high water locations.

- Emerald Gaiety (Euonymus fortunei 'Emerald Gaiety' (PP1,960)) Ht 3-4', Spd 3-4' Dwarf dense evergreen shrub with mounding habit. The dark green leaves have well-defined white borders. A slow growing shrub, useful for some color in shady areas.
 - Emerald 'N Gold (Euonymus fortunei 'Emerald N Gold' (PP 2,231)) Ht 1.5-2', Spd 2-3'

Tightly branched erect habit that forms a low, mounding evergreen shrub. The foliage is emerald green with yellow margins that turn pink to reddish in Winter. In dense shade, leaf margins may become a light-green, then yellow. This is a slow growing plant.

Manhattan (Euonymus kiautschovicus 'Manhattan') Ht 4-6', Spd 4-6'

Upright growing evergreen shrub with very glossy, dark green 2"-2.5" leaves, which are larger than those of other evergreen Euonymus. Moderate to fast grower. Needs to be planted in a location where it gets some protection from the Winter sun; next to an Eastern or Northern facing wall is ideal.

HOLLY, 'Assorted Variety' (Mahonia) Part sun to shade, low to moderate water needs.

- Compact Oregon Grape (Mahonia aquifolium 'Compacta') Ht 2-3', Spd 4-5'
 - This is a more compact form of the Oregon Grape Holly, with a spreading habit. A great foundation plant for a protected shady spot. The leaflets are glossy green and spiny-toothed on an upright shrub. The young growth is bronze-red. Yellow flower clusters appear in late Spring followed by blue-black fruit which is edible, best for jams and jellies
- Creeping Oregon Grape (Mahonia repens) Ht 12-18", Spd 3-4'
 - This Rocky Mountain native makes an excellent groundcover, spreading through underground stolons. Evergreen leaves turn red in Fall and make wonderful Christmas decorations. Yellow flowers appear in Spring followed by blue berries.
- Cregon Grape (Mahonia aquifolium) Ht 3-6', Spd 3-5'

The leaflets are glossy green, spiny-toothed on an upright shrub. The young growth is bronze-red. Yellow flower clusters appear in late Spring followed by blue-black fruit which is edible, best for jams and jellies. The height and form can be controlled by pruning. This plant can spread by underground stems. A North or East exposure is preferable.
